


San Francisco Street Violence Intervention Program (SVIP) Monthly Snapshot - March 2015



Crisis Response


Respond to youth-related homicides, shootings, and stabbings to reduce the rate of violent incidents

SVIP responded to 17 crisis events

4 homicides and 5 non-fatal shootings




Street Outreach

Conduct intervention and Prevention through daily canvassing of identified schools and neighborhood "hot zones"

1,700 individuals contacted through daily canvassing
